

## Vimukti Trust: Annual Report: April 2009 – March 2010

The activities of Vimukti Trust were on a firmer footing in this year since Action Aid also started supporting from February 2009 its work in five taluks out of the 20 supported for past three years by CCFD. The support from Action Aid for the activities in the 5 taluks of HD Kote (Mysore), Bangarapete (Kolar), Bagepally (Chikkaballapura), Pavagada (Tumkur) Yadagiri (Gulbarga) were continued for the second year from January 2010. The activities in other 15 taluks [Anekal (Bangalore Urban), Hosakote (Bangalore Rural), Chennapatna, Magadi (Ramanagara), Madduru (Mandya), Kolar, Maluru, (Kolar), Chikkaballapura, Gauribidanur, Gudibande, Shidlaghatta, Chintamani (Chikkaballapura), Madhugiri (Tumkuru), Bailahongala (Belaganv), Sindhanur (Raichur)] were continued with the support from CCFD.

The residential bridge course (RBC) in Anekal was carried out with the support from SSA (Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan) from June 2010. The two RBCs for boys and girls in Malur were continued during the year. The RBC in Shidlaghatta was stopped in May 2009 when the support from the Labour Commissioner, Bangalore was discontinued. Jeevika Day was celebrated on 16 September 2009 involving leaders from various dalit movements in the state and reflecting on the role of dalit movements in eradication of bonded labour. The state level dalit cultural festival was held on 13 December in Bagepalli.

The year stands out for two significant events in the history of Vimukti trust. The Karnataka Action Plan on Bonded Labour written by Kiran Kamal Prasad at the invitation of the Government and approved by it in July 2007 was finally printed by it at the end of September 2009 after much prodding by VT. The Government had accepted and acted on the suggestion from VT to print a large number of 10,000 copies of the Action Plan in Kannada and 1,000 in English so as to reach them to the officials concerned all over Karnataka and to social activists. VT trust also gave a plan to Rural Development and Panchayat Raj Ministry to distribute them to the officials in a meaningful way. The proposal was to hold a state level release programme inviting the NHRC Chairman or the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court as the Chief Guest and to invite all the DCs, CEOs, Principal Secretaries and Secretaries from key departments. After the state level programme, a programme in each of the districts to explain the contents of the Action Plan to all the district nodal officers, ACs, tahsildars and EOs, Police Inspectors and Judges in the district was to be carried out under the leadership of the DCs and the CEOs. After the district level programmes, similar programmes were to be carried out in each of the taluks under the leadership of the tahsildars and the EOs and involving all taluk nodal officials and the revenue and RDPR officials in the taluk, Gram Panchayats and villages. The Director of NREGA in RDPR, who is in charge of the issue of bonded labour, appreciated the plan but just then the attention of the department was totally focused on carrying out rehabilitation to the victims of the unprecedented floods in north Karnataka at the end of October 2009 without allowing it to act on our proposal on the sensitization programmes on the Action Plan to the officials.

In this context, VT devised its own plan to disseminate the Action Plan to dalit activists and leaders and other progressive activists all over Karnataka and make them initiate various actions on bonded labour in their areas on their own and thus pressurise the officials to act according to the Action Plan. As it had made an appeal for funds for this programme, the Irish Embassy on its own approached VT that it would support the sensitization programmes on the Action Plan in 10 northern districts (Bidar, Gulbarga+Yadgiri, Raichur, Koppal, Bellary, Bijapur, Bagalkote, Gadag, Belganv and Dharwad). VT then managed to get some additional funding from Action Aid to conduct such trainings in another 15 districts (Haveri, Uttara Kannada/Sirsi sub-division, Chitradurga, Dhavanagere, Shimoga, Hassan, Chikmagalur, Mandya, Mysore, Chamarajanagar, Kodagu,

Ramanagar, Tumkur, Kolar and Bangalore Rural). Of the 29 then districts, trainings were not conducted in Dakshina Kannada, Udipi, Chikballapur and Bangalore Urban districts. The new districts and sub-divisions were adopted by each of the 20 taluk activists. Specific days were fixed for the trainings in those districts in December 2009 and January 2010. For 4 to 5 days before the training in the district headquarters, the taluk activists who had adopted the particular district would go round all the taluks, mobilize dalit youth and leaders and motivate them to take part in the trainings. Some key officials and Zilla, taluk and Gram panchayat leaders also would be met and persuaded to attend the programmes. The trainings had brought out a lot of impact (see Annexes 2 and 3).

If the drawing up, approval and printing of the Action Plan on Bonded Labour was a significant achievement for VT in its lobbying efforts, during the year VT was also a recipient of a great international honour. As one team was busy carrying out the sensitization programmes in north Karnataka, on 19 January 2010 it received a message from Free the Slaves (FTS) from Washington DC that it was under consideration for the selection of the prestigious annual international Harriet Tubman Freedom Award given for an organisation working on bonded labour. The award was confirmed a month later which was to be conferred in Los Angeles on 7 November 2010. The FTS team was to visit VT's works in March and then again in April to make a documentary film of its activities. The award was to carry a substantial monetary component given for two years. VT later in June 2010 decided to use the award money to support the activists in the new districts.

After the sensitisation programmes, VT was deliberating on how to sustain the activities in the new districts on keeping up pressure on the administration to continuously take up action according to the Action Plan. It was deliberating on mobilising local funds to support those activities. The announcement of the Freedom Award has helped in the process of establishing the new initiative. However, efforts are still made to generate local funds to sustain the initiative in the long run.

Apart from these significant events, the regular activities were carried out.

**Identification, Release and Rehabilitation of Bonded labourers:** The activists in all the taluks have been submitting various memoranda to the tahsildars, ACs and DCs to release and rehabilitate bonded labourers identified by them and who had made applications for their release and rehabilitation.

**Okkuta:** There were 848 village union samitis in as many villages with a total membership of 14,884. Among them, 2,781 were bonded labourers and 12,103 were agricultural workers (see Table I in Annexe 1 for details of the taluks). Weekly meetings to ascertain their problems, to reflect on their issues and regarding submitting of applications to secure various poverty alleviation schemes were carried out regularly. Trainings on social analysis and leadership were conducted during the year (see Table III in Annexe 1).

**Self Help Groups (see Table II in Annexe 1):** There were 578 SHGs in 848 villages with a membership of 7845 women. They had pooled together a total savings of Rs. 98,70,427. Of this amount, Rs. 56,08,170 were given to the members as loans. Out of these Rs. 7,92,930 have been recovered and the rest are in the process of being recovered.

**Procuring Government Schemes (see Table IV in Annexe 1):** Totally grants of Rs. 64, 55,800 were secured to construct house sites, houses and other housing facilities. Of these Rs. 63,53,300 were to construct houses for 137 persons. Various monthly pensions were procured for the widows, the elderly and the disabled totaling Rs. 34,79,000. Of these widow pensions were Rs.74,800 per month for 187 widows. Various loans and other

facilities totaling Rs. 2,18,47,170 were got from various schemes. Of these, Rs. 1,09,58,720 were from different subsidy schemes under SGSY; Rs. 2,31,000 to buy sheep; Rs. 20,50,000 to buy cows; Rs. 94,000 to buy land; Rs. 1,26,150 worth of plants and seeds; Rs.29,00,000 for irrigation bore wells; Rs.20,10,000 for setting up provision stores; and Rs. 34,77,300 as individual loans.

**Cultural programmes (see Table III in Annexe 1):** Street theatre programmes were given in 131 villages. A state level dalit cultural festival was organized on 13 December in Bagepalli taluk of Chikkaballapura district. Nearly 4000 people gathered for the programme. A souvenir was printed for the occasion. The theme of the souvenir was Dalit Culture and Folk Culture.

**Land Issues:**

1. VT activists intervened in a dispute between upper castes and dalits on grave yard of 30 guntas in Devasandra village in Hosakote taluk and got it settled by the GP President.
2. VT activists carried out rallies on land issues in Madugiri , Magadi and Hoskote taluks involving hundred of people.

**Specific programmes:**

1. Dr.B.R Ambedkar Jayanthi festival was carried out in all taluks on April 14.
2. A road protest was organised in Magadi in April to celebrate the Babu Jagajivan Ram's Birthday.
3. Workers' Day on 1<sup>st</sup> May was carried out in all the taluks in collaboration with other organisations and Govt officials.
4. In May, VT activists joined other dalit organizations to mobilize 1000 dalits for a continuous protest to compel the authorities to complete the construction of Ambedkar Bhavan. The protest was withdrawn after 5 days when the protesters were assured of the speedy construction of the Bhavan by the DC and the area MP.
5. In Yadgiri taluk activists mobilized 60 union leaders on 17 August to press the CEO for the rehabilitation of bonded labourers.
6. In Magadi taluk 60 people took part in a workshop on bonded labour as part of the Bonded Labour System Awareness Day on 25 October. On the same day, in Yadgiri, the activists submitted a memorandum to the RDPR Minister, Ms. Shobha Karandlaje to the release and rehabilitation of bonded labourers.
7. VT activists of Chikballapur district took part in a two day workshop on various issues affecting dalits organized by the district Social Welfare Officer in Chikballapur town on November 9 and 10. Kiran Kamal Prasad was invited as a resource person to speak on Bonded Labour.
8. Chikballapur taluk activists were entrusted by the EO to conduct awareness programmes on child Rights in all Gram Panchayats in the month of November.
9. VT activists in Magadi organized a protest in November for the supply of quality seeds to farmers.
10. VT activists organized a district level programme in Chintamani on rights of women on March 8
10. A protest was organized in Bailhongala taluk in December in front of tahshildar's office to sanction house sites to dalits.
11. Bonded Labour Day was celebrated on January 26 in Bailhongal, Gauribidanur, Magadi, Chikballapur, Pavagada, Bangarapete and Gudibande taluks.
12. In Chennaptan, one person set fire on his wife and ran away. VT activists sent her to Govt Hospital in 108 Ambulance meant for emergency health care and filed a complaint against the husband.

13. In Bailhongal taluk, VT activists agitated for medical free service and supply of tablets and to protect people from viral fever and other deceases.
